At Lift we walk alongside you to create a safe place to grow

The Advance LIFT Service provides 1-to-1 mentoring and group support to young women and girls aged 9-13 across eight London boroughs.

We support girls who have been impacted by abusive and unhealthy relationships, at risk of exclusion from education, at risk of becoming involved in antisocial behaviour and who may be struggling to cope with their experiences.

The Lift service will provide your child with a dedicated mentor who will act as a positive role model that they can meet with on a regular basis at school or in the community.

At Advance, our expertise lies in decades of providing specialist support by women and for women and girls, to achieve safety, justice and equality at the intersection of domestic abuse and the criminal justice system.

We focus on building girls trust, self-identity, self-confidence, skills and ability to recognise when and where to get support.

Who can be referred to the Lift service:

The Lift service supports girls aged 9-13 who:

- Live in Westminster, Hackney, Camden, Islington, Tower Hamlets, Hammersmith & Fulham, Brent or Newham. Referrals from other London boroughs may be accepted if the service has capacity.
- Are experiencing, or at risk of, domestic abuse.
- Are affected by unhealthy relationships, including exploitation, grooming, gang involvement, peer-on-peer abuse or criminal exploitation.
- Are at risk of becoming involved with the criminal justice system.
- Are at risk of becoming NEET (not in education, employment or training), including those at risk of exclusion or with low school attendance.
- Have been affected by violence or abuse at home or other adverse childhood experiences.
